

What a difference a month makes

Columbus heads to Peoria with wins in nine of last 10 games

BY DAVE EMINIAN

The Columbus Cot-PEORIA tonmouths wandered to an 0-7-0 start this season and a sweep at the hands of the Peoria Rivermen in Carver Arena in mid-November.

But these are not those Cottonmouths, setting up camp in Peoria for a post-Christmas two-game set

this weekend.

This Columbus team is the hottest team in the league, with wins in nine of its last 10 games. It had a 10-game win streak — third-longest in league history — retired last week.

They may have left Peoria in mid-November in a mess, but they return Friday night as an SPHL title contender.

"Actually, they didn't play that badly when they were here last time," Rivermen coach Jean-Guy Trudel said. "We knew that team would get it together, and they are on a roll.

The Rivermen are rolling, too, with a four-game win streak that has pushed them into second place, two points behind Pensacola. Both teams have played 20 games, but Pensacola has already logged 13 home contests while Peoria has been at home only 9 times.

Peoria's home-ice record is a

Illini get the last 'giggle'

Beckman helps Illini win three of final five, earn spot in Heart of Dallas

CHAMPAIGN — Tim Beckman finally got the Illinois football team to its next destination.

After winning three of its last five games and finishing 6-6, his team was invited to face Louisiana Tech (8-4) in the Zaxby's Heart of Dallas bowl at Cotton Bowl Sta-dium in Dallas on Friday.

In spite of constantly being doubted, Beckman fulfilled his preseason promise to win more games and make postseason

appearance in his third year as head coach. "A month

nois accepted its invitation to Dallas. "It's kind of a giggle now. When people doubt you and you prove them wrong, it's very rewarding.'

If Beckman is to make good on his other promise to make Illinois contend for Big Ten and national championships — one year of disproving doubters can't be enough.

More is necessary, and it

starts with Louisiana Tech. The Bulldogs haunt Beckman from his first year with Illinois in 2012, when they routed the Illini, 52-24, in

Champaign. While far from the same team, Louisiana Tech now features a high-scoring offense from the frontlines to

the backfield. Running back Kenneth Dixon ran for 1,236 yards – fifth and 21 touchdowns most in the nation — during the regular season. He also surpassed 3,000 career rush-

ing yards as a junior. When the Illini last faced Dixon in 2012, he netted just 41 yards on 11 carries with no touchdowns.

Then again, the Illini defense wasn't ranked sixth worst in the nation and allowing 249.6 rushing yards per game in 2012 as it is

"They're going to go fastpaced with that spread offense, but I think the biggest key is stopping the run," linebacker Mason Monheim said. "Dixon, I remember playing him when we were both freshmen. Great back, powerful, and can move."

Newcomer quarterback and redshirt senior Cody Sokol has also brought much success in his first year with the Bulldogs, throwing for 3.189 yards and 29 touchdowns passes — 11th most

WAYNE McCLAIN NATIONAL CHAMPION BASKETBALL COACH 1954-2014

ayne McClain was born to coach basketball. Head coach. Assistant coach. Associate head coach. In the gym, titles don't matter much except to define who's in charge and specific roles within a staff. Coaching is

And Wayne McClain coached basketball as well as anybody.

coaching.

His career as a head coach was relatively short: eight seasons. But, oh, what seasons they were! Three successive state championships, the 1997 USA Today national high school championship and a record of 195-46 put McClain's name on the lips of every basketball fan in Illinois and a good many more beyond our state borders. Those accomplishments thrust him onto a pedestal of Peoria's all-time sports giants.

In his years as a head coach, there was never a question who was in charge. McClain firmly supported parents who disciplined their kids, but he had little tolerance for parents sticking their noses into how he coached. A Peoria policeman found that out one day when he attempted to question McClain's methods and decisions regarding his son. "Do I tell you how to be a cop?" McClain asked the man. Upon receiving "no" for an answer, Mc-Clain bluntly invited the man to leave "my gym."

The public saw McClain on the arena sidelines, dressed to the nines. But for 29 years as an assistant coach and eight as head man, his real work clothes were sweats and sneakers, and his office was the practice gym.

Working with the legendary head coach Dick Van Scyoc, McClain and Chuck Westendorf teamed to provide Manual High School with a staff as formidable as any in Illinois high schools and colleges.

By the late 1970s, Van Scyoc's old-school methods and attitudes weren't resonating so well with the kids. McClain, a product of Peoria's South Side and a star on one of Van Scyoc's greatest teams, joined the staff in 1977 and helped translate. McClain was as old-school as Van Scyoc: a strict disciplinarian with a sharp tongue and little tolerance for deviation of any kind. But he also related to a new generation of kids on a level Van Scyoc could

Van Scyoc, though still very much in charge, morphed from a renowned curmudgeon into the beloved CEO of Manual basketball. McClain and Westendorf did the grunt work, running practice drills, scrutinizing every movement, bringing everything to a screaming stop to correct the slightest mistake. And Manual became a perennial state power, winning a state championship in Van Scyoc's final season at the helm.

When Van Scyoc retired, McClain took over, and after a splendid seven-season run, accepted a position as an assistant to Bill Self at the University of Illinois. He remained there when Self left for Kansas, then held the young Illini stars together during the transition to new head coach Bruce Weber. Two years later, that group put together a 37-2 record and placed second in the NCAA tournament.

BRUCE SAURS THE SAVIOR OF PEORIA PRO HOCKEY

ruce Saurs and the Peoria Rivermen extended each other's lifespans in the summer of 2013, when the great Peoria sports icon came out of retirement to save the 33-year franchise and front the money needed to put it in the SPHL.

About a year later Saurs died, at age 88, on July 10, having made sure the franchise he owned or co-owned for nearly 20 years would live on as his legacy.

The comeback — for both the man, and the team - almost never happened.

"We were against it, thought he was too old to do it, didn't want him to take the financial risk and all that," Scott Saurs, one of Bruce Saurs' three sons, says. "Bruce's health had been (declining) for a while, he kept talking about guys coming back to play for him who had played many years ago. But he was really worried that having no pro hockey team here would create a huge void.

We saw how much he wanted to do it. And then something amazing happened: It changed him. He brought hockey back and it brought him back and he was excited and happy and it really perked him up.

"Our family saw that and we were in favor of it and we supported him."

The Rivermen, under co-owners and former Saurs execs Bart Rogers and John Butler, held an elaborate ceremony honoring the elderly owner on Opening Night in October 2013.

'We are so thankful the way Bart handled all that, it was a tremendous, emotional ceremony," Scott Saurs said. "Thank God that happened. Bruce never really understood how much he meant to people, and the impact he had on them. He saw it that night and was just thrilled by it."

On Bruce Saurs' watch, the Rivermen saw nearly 200 players, coaches, radio play-by-play men and execs reach the NHL. The team won championships in the IHL in 1990-91 and in the ECHL in 1999-2000 and set a pro hockey record with an 18-game win streak.

He was gone before Opening Night 2014. The Rivermen put a picture of Saurs in a place of honor on the Carver Arena wall, wore special jerseys that incorporated an epic photo of him drinking from the IHL's Turner Cup, and dedicated a permanent place on the team's uniform to honor him.

In July, thousands attended his visitation, and a north Peoria church was packed with friends, family and dignitaries from around the hockey world for his

"My father always had a very hardened, tough personality as a person and as a businessman," Scott Saurs said. "But in his final weeks, he was a different person. He became this sweet, gentle man. We'd sit in bed with him and he'd hold our hands, and we'd just talk, and he'd hug us and kiss us.

"I'll remember him that way."

CHUCK ROLINSKI THE FATHER OF TWO-CLASS HIGH SCHOOL BASKETBALL 1932-2014

t sounds quaint today: Chuck Rolinski, the "Father of Two-Class Basketball." Two classes in high school

basketball? Only two? Only basketball? But in 1971 Illinois, this was

revolutionary stuff.

Post-World War II, as rural Americans began migrating to better-paying jobs in the cities and their suburbs, the dynamics of high school competition began to change. Small schools consolidated into bigger ones or simply disappeared. The baby boom turned city and suburban schools into resource-rich campuses filled with kids. Surviving smaller schools struggled to keep up.

One by one, state high school associations across the country addressed the perceived problem by splitting competition into classes, defined by school enrollment.

Rolinski, who spent his entire life in the tiny Marshall County town of Toluca and coached its boys basketball program from 1956-1990, became the leader of the movement in Illinois. What Rolinski was looking for wasn't so much a better crack at winning a state championship as giving the kids a fighting chance to win a regional here and there, to experience the thrill of playing the Peoria Sectional at that madhouse on Main Street, Bradley's Robertson Memorial Field House.

Illinois sports in those days penalized small schools by making them play district tournaments to qualify for regionals, where they immediately would be thrown against big-school powerhouses. Splitting into two classes got rid of the districts and put hundreds of small schools directly into regionals, where they needed only to win two or three games, rather than five, to reach a sectional.

All movements need a leader, and it was Rolinski who galvanized the support necessary in Illinois to make basketball the state's first two-class sport, effective in the 1971-72 season. Rolinski, who retired in 1990 with a career coaching record of 649-252, never reached the state finals. But in 2007 he was named one of the "100 Legends of the IHSA Boys

Basketball Tournament.' Blessed with a perpetual smile when he wasn't barking from a sideline, Rolinski in 1971 invited top coaches around the state to Toluca for a meeting. There, the Illinois Basketball Coaches Association was formed, and there the organization's offices would stay, with Rolinski as executive director, until his death in September.

He was forever an ambassador for basketball. Under his direction, the IBCA began its annual all-star games, among the first off-season high school contests of any kind in the nation. And, of course, there is the IBCA Hall of

The ongoing joke about the IBCA Hall is that there are more people who are enshrined than people who aren't. For Rolinski. though, this hall of fame never was about exclusivity. It was about promoting basketball and honoring all those good people who in some way — as a coach, player, member of the media or just plain "friend of basketball" — made the sport better.

Just as Rolinski spent his life doing.

Taking on Tennessee State

Illinois State alum is the youngest coach in Division I basketball

NASHVILLE, TENN. (AP) -Dana Ford and his Tennessee State Tigers are learning on the job together.

Ford is the youngest coach in Division I men's basketball after being hired in April at the age of 29, and he has one of the least experienced teams with only one senior from last season and 12 newcomers.

"It's a huge mystery," Ford said. "Being the youngest coach, I'm learning on the job and having (least) experienced team, they're learning on the job so we're all kind of just learning together.

"Our attitudes have been great, the guys have really gotten better ... I've probably gotten a little bit better as a coach too coming up with different motivation methods and having a better understanding of who I have on my team.

Ford, now 30, had a challenge taking over a program

that went 5-25 last season. Tennessee State was the first historically black college to win a national title. winning three NAIA championships between 1957 and 1959. The school has sent the likes of Robert Covington, Truck Robinson, Anthony Mason and Carlos Rogers to the NBA.

But the Tigers have had more coaches than winning seasons the past two

decades. Athletic director Teresa Phillips took a chance in bringing back Ford as head coach after he was an assistant with the Tigers under John Cooper between 2009 and 2011.

Ford, who played at Illinois State, got his start in coaching as a graduate assistant for Gregg Marshall at Winthrop and then Wichita State. He was an assis-

tant coach at Chipola Junior College Florida in before join-Cooper ing at Tennessee State. Ford rejoined Marshall at Wichita

State for 2011-12 before going to Illinois State for the past two seasons. "Obviously having some

built-in relationships Ford said. helped me," 'When I was here the first time, we had a tremendous amount of success.'

Knowing his way around certainly helped as Ford went from being introduced April 21 to putting together essentially a brand new team in his first eight weeks.

'You can't just be on there saying, 'I'm a new coach at a new school.' You've got to be a little more impressive than that," Ford said. "I was able to sell what we had done years removed, but it was close enough people could relate. I used that to my advantage and having been thing better," Ford said. here was an added bonus."

Ford made a quick enough impression to be voted one of Nashville's most beautiful people by a local magazine this summer.

Only senior Jay Harris has any real Division I experience. Ford also signed six freshmen, four junior college players and two Division I transfers. Of the newcomers, only Christian Crockett had any Division I experience after playing about a minute in two games at Mount Saint Mary's.

"I was just basically telling him I have no more players. So he gave me a warning, and the next possession they called a foul. I said, 'That's it. I don't have any.' The look on his face said it all."

'Home' for holiday in South Beach

James scores 30 points, but Heat beat Cavaliers on Christmas in Miami

MIAMI (AP) — LeBron James was running the gamut of emotions Thursday when he arrived at the arena that he called home for the past four seasons.

So did the Miami Heat fans who were seeing him again.

They booed the four-time NBA MVP when he and the Cleveland Cavaliers took the court for warmups, booed the first few times he touched the ball, gave him plenty of cheers but still a mixed welcome when he was introduced as a starter, then cheered when he turned the ball over on one of his first touches.

But perhaps the truest measure of how James is remembered came during the first timeout of the game, when the Heat unveiled a tribute video for their former star — a minute-long series of clips commemorating his four NBA Finals runs and two titles in Miami, after which he waved to the crowd and got a lengthy standing ovation.

No, Miami isn't happy he left. But, no, Miami also hasn't forgotten what James meant to the Heat.

"I gave everything and more to this city when I was here," James said before the game, his first time back at the arena since leaving Miami for Cleveland this past summer. "Never disrespected this city or the franchise, or any of my teammates. Everything is professional. I gave it all. That's all I can do.'

James took a seat on the scorers' table near midcourt for the last 30 seconds or so of that video, watching it on the giant overhead screen.

"I've got a lot of memories here, man," James said.

It was predictably an emotional return for James, who acknowledged feeling butterflies when he walked in and headed toward the visitors' locker room for the first time in nearly five years. He scored 30 points, but his Cavs

lost to the Heat 101-91. "What me and my teammates created here while we were here, it's going to last forever," James said. "You can never take that out of the books.

AROUND THE RIM: Heat guard Dwyane Wade scored 24 of his 31 points in the first half, and Luol Deng finished with 25 points to help beat the Cavaliers. ... Russell Westbrook scored 34 points to lead the Thunder over the Spur 114-106 in a rematch of last season's Western Conference Finals in San Antonio. OKC was without reigning MVP Kevin Durant, and the Spurs were missing Finals MVP Kawhi Leonard.

... John Wall had 24 points and 11 assists, eluding the Knicks all day until getting knocked to the floor by a flagrant foul that sparked an altercation, and Washington won 102-91 in New York. Quincy Acy knocked Wall down with a forearm shove with 5:31 to play. Wall pushed Acy, who responded with a punch that appeared to hit Wall behind the neck. Carmelo Anthony scored 34 for the Knicks, who have dropped six straight and 16 of 17.



6 GRUESOME INJURY HALTS **PEORIA RIVERMEN** GAME

ustin Cseter skated into the corner as an opposing player for the Huntsville Havoc and staggered out of it as an adopted son for the hockey world in an Oct. 25 game against the Peoria Rivermen at Carver Arena.

Cseter suffered a gruesome injury when he was inadvertently gashed on his right thigh by an opponent's skate. Blood poured out. He slumped to the ice. The arena fell silent while players frantically gestured and shouted for emergency medical personnel.

A hockey stick was broken in half and used to make a tourniquette to stop the bleeding. Cseter was rushed to a downtown Peoria hospital, where the wound was closed with multiple internal stitches and 8 staples on the surface.

within a day. ESPN interviewed the reporter. CBS and FOX sports picked up coverage as the story became

national. Today, Cseter rests on the 30-day IR for Huntsville. The game that night was suspended, and will be resumed

in February. Really, eight staples is just all in a day's work for a hock-ey player," Cseter joked in the days after the injury. "I won't forget the feeling on that ice, though. 

World Series of Poker starts

The 45th Annual World Series of Poker kicked off seven weeks of play in Las Vegas on Tuesday, promising the tournament chammillion and enticing tens of thousands of players with a prize pool estimated at \$200 million.

The 65-event series at the Rio resort begins with a \$500 casino employees' game, a sort of warm-up for organizers, and will culminate July 5 with the start of the No-Limit Hold'em Main Event. That event narrows the playing field to nine people over the course of 10 days before finalists break for several months and reunite in November for the finals.

An estimated 80,000 players will enter the tournament, and organizers expect they'll cross the \$200 million prize giveaway threshold for only the second time in their history. Last year, the World Series of Poker gave out \$197 million in

Just as important to Mead was it established a school record.


"The whole stretch I was trying to close that gap,' she said. "And I did. It's a relief to get the record."

Taking the baton, she trailed Illini West's Paige Brav.



double winner was Dunlap senior Trevor Fox, who bettered top seed Keith King of Richwoods in the shot put (season-best 55 feet, -inches) and Pekin junior John Hintz of Pekin in the discus (156-10).

"It was really nice to come here and get a good sweep before state, gives me a little confidence said Fox, who at state is seeded fifth in the shot and sixth in the discus. "It was a little less (distance) than I was hoping, but it was good enough.'

Notre Dame bookended the night on the track by winning both the 4x800 (8:24.58) and the 4x400 (3:28.48), with season-best times.







Morgan Park claimed its second straight title in 3A with a 59-49 victory over Lincoln in the afternoon.


Both games were part of a weekend ripping with excitement, drama and intrigue, all the way to the last buckets.

Georgia repeats as NCAA women's champion

MINNEAPOLIS — Georgia scored 528 points and defended its NCAA title at the women's swimming and diving championships on Saturday. The Bulldogs won their sixth title since 1999. Stanford

recorded its best finish since 2010, claiming second with 402.5 points. California, which has three titles since 2009, settled for third with 386 points. Georgia had as many swimmers (10) quali-

fy for the finals and consolation finals in the individual swim events than Stanford and Cal combined

Brittany MacLean broke the NCAA record in the 1,650yard freestyle with a time of 15:27.84. The previous record was 15:37.06, set by UNC's Stephanie Peacock in 2012.

Indiana sophomore Brooklynn Snodgrass became the second Hoosier ever to win the 200 backstroke (1:50.22) when she edged Cal's defending champion and record holder Elizabeth Pelton (1:50.55) by 0.03 of a second.

Olympic gold medalist Rachel Bootsma failed to qualify for the 200 butterfly in the prelims for Cal. Southern California diver Haley Ishimatsu, who represented the U.S. in the 2008 Olympics, defended her NCAA title in the platform dive with a score of 365.15.

"I thought our kids competed," Crimson head coach Tommy Amaker said. "We knew we would.'



PEORIA — Two points and one Miles was the difference Saturday night in the Class 4A boys basketball state championship game.

With the battle of the big men not as big as anticipated, it was the play of 6-foot-3 guard Miles Reynolds that helped Chicago Whitney Young (28-5) to its third state title in a 46-44 victory over Lisle Benet at Carver Arena. It was the Dolphins' first state title since 2009.

But once Whitney Young secured a 46-44 victory Saturday night over Lisle Benet, he was big man on the Dolphins' campus away from its West Side home. Maybe it was because

Reynolds wrapped the firstplace trophy in his arms and lofted it above his hea as scores of Young players and fans danced and swayed merrily on the Carver Arena court. More likely. it was because of what he had done earlier, before the masses descended.

Reynolds didn't steal the trophy. But in a game in which big men had been ballyhooed, the 6-foot-3 guard stole the show.

"This is one of the best feelings I've ever had,' Reynolds said amid the postgame din. "It's just crazy."

The same might be said about Reynolds' performance in his final high school game. One in which he matched the title his brother J.R. Reynolds won as a member of Young's 2009 state-championship squad.

The younger Reynolds, a Saint Louis recruit, finished with a team-high 19 points. He scored eight in the first quarter, including two 3-pointers, as Young forged an 18-10 lead.

"We just have a good crop of kids coming through," Rockford Lutheran coach Tom Guse said. "Basketball is really popular right now. It's really hard to put a finger on it. You see the things Fred is doing and it motivates your kids to get in the gym."

"We're all brothers on this team and he's all of our best friend," Stevenson senior Matt Morrissey said. "This is tough for all of us right now, but we're happy for the

Brunson led Stevenson with 18 points, but Connor Cashaw with 17 and Morrissey with 16 did the heavy lifting to get the Patriots (32-2) a 54-42 lead through three quarters.

Stevenson made 10 3pointers as Edwardsville (30-4) gave up open looks in trying to contain Brunson, who scored 56 points Friday. Brunson scored nine in the fourth quarter, all from the free-throw line. "We wanted to try and

Waldo said that had Brunson not played, it likely would have forced changes to his defense. But he did play and Stevenson beat Edwardsville in Carver Arena for the second consecutive year. The Patriots won a semifinal meeting last year.

"I'm very proud of our players for their guts, determination and effort," Stevenson coach Patrick Ambrose said. "As I said yesterday, the sun will rise, and it did, and we will rise with it."

PEORIA — On the second try, the Chicago Orr boys basketball team ended the season on a high note.

A year after going 0-2 and finishing fourth in the Class 3A state tournament, the Spartans beat Rockford Lutheran, 55-45, to claim the third-place trophy on Saturday afternoon at Carver

Senior Louis Adams Jr. led the way for Orr (25-5), finishing with 23 points, seven boards, three assists and three steals.

"Tonight was really important to us," Orr coach Louis Adams said. "Tonight was like a championship night for us. We came here last year

and didn't even place. We got fourth place. Today we wanted to make sure we got some recognition, and we played fairly well.' Lutheran (30-5) got off to

a fast start, grabbing a 17-7 lead after the first period. It closed out the quarter with a 12-2 spurt, getting big treys from Kendall Lawson and Nate Wieting (12 points, 11 In the second quarter, the

Orr defense took over, and the Spartans used a pair of nine-point runs to take a 27-20 lead at intermission. Lutheran went 1-for-10

from the floor with six turnovers in the second quarter. "We got off to a good start," Crusaders coach Tom

Guse said. "Then, credit them, because they put a lot of pressure on us and we had a few too many turnovers.

"We have a bunch of guys with tremendous amount of character and heart that were not going to end their season without continuing to fight all the way to that final buzzer," Guse said.
"That's why they were in Peoria to begin with, because of their ferocious intensity to win. 'That's why we got back in

the game." Adams Jr. then scored five

PEORIA — To most observers of the Class 3A thirdplace game Saturday at Carver Arena, Rockford Lutheran junior Ryan Dolan was a tall, skinny kid who played only on offense in the waning, desperate moments of his team's unsuccessful comeback against Chicago Orr.

Chicago maintains state hold

Morgan Park, Young state titles latest in run of success by Chicago Public League

Chicago Public League schools, for the second consecutive season, took back to the Windy City both championship trophies from the high school boys basketball largeclasses state finals. Morgan Park won its second

consecutive state title in Class 3A with a 59-49 victory over Lincoln on Saturday afternoon at Carver Arena. Whitney Young beat Lisle Benet 46-44 for the 4A state title on Saturday night.

Orr finished third in 3A and took home a finals trophy for the second consecutive season.

"It's a great accomplishment, not only for the teams that are here but for our entire city, all our schools and all our children," said Thomas Trotter, executive director of athletics for Chicago Public Schools. "I remember back when only one of our teams got to go down-

It wasn't that long ago.

The CPL, the athletics branch of the CPS, joined the Illinois High School Association in The first boys basketball state

title for the Public League came 31 years later, in '58, when Marshall capped an unbeaten season with a 70-64 win over Rock Falls at Huff Gym in Champaign.

Marshall won again in '60, and Carver claimed the state championship in '63.

As part of the IHSA's split to two classes, in 1972, the CPL and IHSA reach a quasi-membership agreement for postseason competition. All CPL teams would be considered Class AA, and the winner of the CPL-organized City tournament would advance to the IHSA's Elite

Eight, in most team sports. Under that setup, Chicago teams won nine AA boys basketball state titles (King three, and Westinghouse, Simeon, Manley, Morgan Park, Phillips and

Hirsch one each) in 31 years. All that changed in 2002 when Arne Duncan, then CEO of the CPS and now the United States Secretary of Education, proposed to the IHSA that CPL schools be treated like every other member, with classification based on enrollment and postseason assignments beginning at the regional or sectional

complex level. duced enrollments at many Chicago schools. At the time he said one of his primary interests was putting the smaller-enrollment CPL schools into the Class

A postseason for athletics.
"We want to create an equal opportunity for all out student athletes," Duncan said in 2002. "Getting more of our basketball teams to state is about 3 percent

of my rationale.' The CPL tournament was changed to an in-season event.

Under the new arrangement. the CPL put two teams in the AA Elite Eight in 2004 (Simeon and Farragut), and brought home two trophies in '06 and '07 (in both seasons Simeon won the AA state title, Marshall fin-

Everything changed again in 2008 when the IHSA introduced four classes. That year, the CPL didn't have a single team in the 4A (largest class) Final Four. Marshall (3A) and North Lawndale (2A), however, both won

The CPL has collected at least once trophy each year since

Young's 4A state champion-

ship in '09 was followed by Simeon's title four-pear (2010-13). Young's title on Saturday night gave the CPL six consecu-

tive state championships in 4A, and with Morgan Park's second straight 3A title and Orr's thirdplace finish in 3A, six finals trophies over the last two seasons. Morgan Park earlier this sea-

son lost to Whitney Young in a CPL tournament semifinal.

"The City teams, we tend to beat each other up," said Morgan Park coach Nick Irvin, who played at Carver during the two-class era. "Under the old system, our loss in the (CPL) tournament would have ended our season. Now, we're state champions again.'

seconds left. He quickly shot the ball, trying to sell a shooting foul, but the ref wasn't buying. The 3-pointer that splashed the net was ruled no good and Brunson spun away to his left, flinging his arms upward. He quickly brought them back down and pumped them across his chest as he faced the Young crowd.

In real time, nobody noticed Brunson's fingers. But at least three cameras caught them. As Brunson began to drop his arms, his left middle finger remained pointed at the rafters. Available photos were inconclusive as to whether the upraised finger on his left hand was the index or middle. But there it was, frozen for eternity, along

with a defiant look on his face. Accident? Intentional? The single frame is damning. It's going viral on

Twitter and the Internet.

Comcast Sports video, played at normal speed, is inconclusive about the gesture, although reporters at courtside speculated as to why Brunson's emotional reaction with his arms didn't merit a technical foul. In super slow motion, the video looks bad, too. But neither still photos nor video can get inside a

young man's head.

"He's never had a 'T' in his life. In his life!" Rick Brunson said. "I'm not saying he's a great kid who does nothing wrong, but you can't tell me that a guy who's making a 56-point run and who's never been called for a 'T' would risk a technical foul in that situation. It makes no sense."

Rick Brunson played college basketball at Temple for John Chaney, a no-nonsense disciplinarian. He also played nine years in the NBA. He admits to fiery on-court reactions himself, but says he has been adamant with Jalen that it is unacceptable to behave in the way that the photo might suggest. "I've raised him to be big-

ger than that," Rick said, and he shared numerous incidents of Jalen walking away from physical and verbal abuse on the court. He also shared an incident when Jalen had a momentary lapse in judgment and snapped at a rival coach, then apologized immediately after the game.

So, is it possible that this apparent gesture was a split-second loss of compo-

"I would go against ev-

erything I believe and have said to say, 'Yes,' "
Rick said. "I definitely understand what you're saying. But, no. I just know it's out of character for him to do that."

Reporters who regularly cover Jalen vouch for his character. And the young man was awarded the 2014 Illinois Gatorade Player of the Year, an award that takes into account not just ability but character and academics.

As the photo blew up late Friday night on Twitter, Jalen posted an apology to the Whitney Young fans, calling the gestures "Completely an accident just frustration." On the advice of his father, he deleted it. "It makes you look like you're guilty," Rick said he told his son. "He was apologizing for the image, not the action, because he didn't do anything."

Facing a standing-roomonly crowd of reporters in the interview room after the third-place game, Jalen declined to address the situation. He was measured, polite and direct. There was no hint of defiance in his voice or body language. He was poised and gracious uncommonly so for a

high school junior facing such scrutiny.

In the end, this was

about a split-second. The Comcast video was shot at a speed of 29 frames per second. Brunson's fingers were up by themselves for five frames, or .17 seconds. Barely a blink.

Even if one or two fingers were extended in a vulgar expression of disgust, Brunson clearly wasn't trying to show up his opponents or the officials. The thousands of people in Carver Arena could no more catch what he did with the naked eve than they could hear all the players and coaches whose muttered profanities are drowned out by the din of the crowd.

I'm not excusing what might have happened. There is no place for bad sportsmanship in competition. The IHSA has a vested interest in promoting good sportsmanship and dealing appropriately with bad.

But the IHSA also has a responsibility to be reasonable and fair-minded in its judgments, and the decision to lift the suspension and allow Brunson to play in the third-place game was the right thing to do.


