5 things to do this weekend

1. The big movies opening this week are "Chappie," an R sci-fi thriller from director Neill Blomkamp that stars Sharlto Copley, Dev Patel, Hugh Jackman and Sigourney Weaver; "The Second Best Exotic Marigold Hotel," a PG comedy-drama starring Judi Dench and Maggie Smith; and "Unfinished Business," an R comedy starring Vince Vaughn, Dave Franco, Tom Wilkinson and James Marsden.

'A Peace of My Mind'

MONMOUTH — What does peace mean to you? That's the central question photographer and storyteller John Noltner has been asking people for his social commentary project, "A Peace of My Mind."

Founded in 2009, "A Peace of My Mind" is a multimedia art project that fosters public dialogue about issues related to conflict resolution, civic responsibility, and peace. With engaging portraits and compelling personal stories, nearly 100 diverse subjects describe what peace means to them, how they work toward it in their lives, and some of the obstacles they encounter along the way. Those profiled include Holocaust survivors and a homeless man, a Somali refugee and a military chaplain, a pottery instructor and an oil company executive. Artists, volunteers, politicians, and business leaders all share their thoughts and inspiring stories in a series that celebrates our common experience and sense of community. "A Peace of My Mind" is sponsored by the Peace, Ethics, and Social Justice Program at Monmouth College and will be on exhibit at the Buchanan Center for Arts March 11 through April 17. KNOXVILLE — The Knoxville High School Drama Club presents "The Secret Case of Sherlock Holmes" on March 13 and 14.

Jennifer Sprecher, faculty sponsor of the club, said it's the first play to be performed on Knoxville High School's new stage.

"The students and I are extremely excited to be able to have such up-to-date and high-end materials to work with," Sprecher said. "The students helped design our T-shirts this year, and the slogan on the back states: 'From Gymnasium to Auditorium: We've come a long way!' That slogan pretty much sums up how many of my cast and crew feel."

"Of course the auditorium was one of the very last elements of the new school construction that was recently completed, so training on sound and lighting systems have only just recently been finalized and the new spot lights were just installed last week," she said. "There are a ton of nerves both on my end and from my crew members to make sure we know how everything works so that we can produce a smooth running production."

Sprecher said the setting will "allow our audiences to finally be able to hear our actors/actresses. We have struggled with the sound system for many years in the old Jensen gymnasium, and now with the way the auditorium was constructed there shouldn't be any struggle to hear the performers. The room is acoustically wonderful."

"The Secret Case of Sherlock Holmes" is a comedy that thrusts a very young Holmes and Watson through a time machine built by H.G. Wells into the future. Once there, the characters meet quite a few patients at the Freudly

The Keystone Light Friends of The Bob & Tom Show comedy Tour is hosted by McGee.

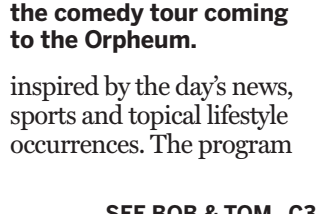

GALESBURG — The Galesburg Civic Art Center has announced the exhibit "Wreckage of the Heart: An Exhibition of Works by PanBambina."

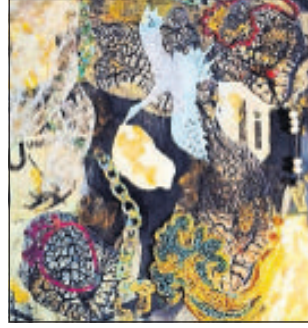
This exhibition will be on display in the BLICK Gallery through March 13. An opening reception will be 5-7 p.m. today and is free and open to the public.

Today is Thursday, March 5, the 64th day of 2015. There are 301 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On March 5, 1770, the Boston Massacre took place as British soldiers who'd been taunted by a crowd of colonists opened fire, killing five people.

On this date:

In 1766, Antonio de Ulloa arrived in New Orleans to assume his duties as the first Spanish governor of the Louisiana Territory, where he encountered resistance from the French residents. In 1868, the Senate was organized into a Court of Impeachment to decide charges against President Andrew Johnson, who was later acquitted. In 1933, in German parliamentary elections, the Nazi Party won 44 percent of the vote; the Nazis joined with a conservative nationalist party to gain a slender majority in

the Reichstag. In 1946, Winston Churchill delivered his "Iron Curtain" speech at Westminster College in Fulton, Missouri. In 1953, Soviet dictator Josef Stalin died after three decades in power. Composer Sergei Prokofiev died in Moscow at age 61. In 1955, Elvis Presley made his television debut on "Louisiana Hayride" carried by KSLA-TV Shreveport (although audio recordings exist, there is no known video footage of this appearance). In 1960, Cuban newspaper photographer Alberto Korda took the now-famous picture of guerrilla leader Ernesto "Che" Guevara during a memorial service in Havana for victims of a ship explosion. Elvis Presley was discharged from the U.S. Army. In 1963, country music performers Patsy Cline, Cowboy Copas and Hawkshaw Hawkins died in the crash of their plane, a Piper Comanche, near Camden, Tennessee, along with pilot Randy Hughes (Cline's manager). In 1970, the Treaty on the

Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons went into effect after 43 nations ratified it. In 1979, NASA's Voyager 1 space probe flew past Jupiter, sending back photographs of the planet and its moons. In 1982, comedian John Belushi was found dead of a drug overdose in a rented bungalow in Hollywood; he was 33. **Ten years ago:** Syrian President Bashar Assad announced a two-stage pullback of his country's forces from Lebanon. **Five years ago:** Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton, visiting Guatemala, told reporters that demand for narcotics in the United States was fueling drug violence in Central America as she acknowledged a measure of U.S. responsibility for what she called "a terrible criminal scourge." New York Democratic Rep. Eric Massa, facing a harassment complaint by a male staffer, said he was stepping down from his seat with "a profound sense of failure." Andrew Peel, 105, a member of the World War II Resistance, died in

Bristol, England. **One year ago:** President Barack Obama's choice to lead the Justice Department's Civil Rights Division, Debo Adebile, was blocked by bipartisan Senate opposition over his legal work at the NAACP Legal Defense Fund on behalf of Mumia Abu-Jamal, who's serving life in prison in the 1981 shooting death of Philadelphia police officer Daniel Faulkner. The former Internal Revenue Service official at the heart of the controversy over the agency's targeting of conservative groups, Lois Lerner, once again refused to answer questions at a House hearing. **Today's Birthdays:** Actor James Noble is 93. part of his life's work, and demonstrates that through our secret struggles and adversity, we can help others.

The concept of the project was that completely anonymous people decorate a postcard and portray a secret that they had never previously revealed.

KNOX COLLEGE

Artist to paint portraits of locals

GALESBURG — The Artist-in-Residence this fall at Knox College wants to paint a picture of the people of Galesburg — more than 300 of them.

During a three-month residency with the Knox College Art Department, John Bakker, a Chicago-based artist and educator, will be producing a multi-part work he calls the Galesburg Portrait Project. His goal is to make portraits of more than 300 local residents — at least 1 percent of the city's population.

"Since the mid '90s, I've been producing public artworks consisting of hundreds of hand painted portraits of the people who make up various communities," Bakker explains. In 2004 he painted portraits of over 500 people from the neighborhood around Chicago's 6th District Police Station. In 2010 he created an exhibit featuring hundreds of portraits based on photos from the on-line student directory at Wheaton College.

"Throughout history, portraits have been painted mostly for the wealthy and powerful," Bakker says. "What interests me is the way a hand made portrait shows the unique meaning and dignity of the individual. The time and attention given to painting a portrait is a way of valuing people for who they are, not what they achieve or the money they make."

Painted portraits provide a striking contrast with our "culture of instant images that are as disposable as they are convenient, as well

as the attractive but highly manipulated advertising images that actually undermine our sense of dignity," Bakker says.

Bakker has already started working, by preparing more than 300 wooden panels that he will bring to Galesburg in September.

Ultimately the individual panels will be arranged in a single massive display, 6 feet tall and 20 feet wide, but can be reconfigured to fit a variety of exhibit spaces.

Because the portraits are on panels of boxes, the

project can be placed next to a wall, or free-standing in an exhibit area.

"My hope is that it will travel around the community to schools, storefronts, public buildings before finding a permanent home in Galesburg," Bakker says.

The next step is soliciting photos from people who would like to be included in the Galesburg Portrait Project.

Printed photos can be delivered in person to Bakker at The Box, 306 E. Simmons.

Submissions should include the name and

occupation of the person pictured.

"As an option, you can include a few words about Galesburg as a community because I am considering the possibility of including your text within the portraits," Bakker says.

Entries range from admissions of sexual misconduct and criminal activity to confessions of secret desires, embarrassing habits, hopes and dreams.

The secrets are meant to be empowering both to the author and to those who read them.

Warren claims that the postcards are inspirational to those who read them, have healing powers for those who write them, give hope to people who identify with a stranger's secret, and create an anonymous community of acceptance.

To date Warren has published five books, compiled of submitted secrets, including some which were never posted on the website.

Warren has stated that he includes a secret of his own in each of the PostSecret books. His "secret" is not anonymous like most;

rather, Warren signs his.

For example: "Sometimes when we think we are keeping a secret, that secret is actually keeping us. — Frank," according to wikipedia.org.

thank-you note?

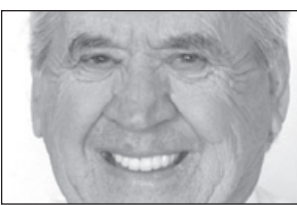

Dr. Wallace: Which offers the better protection from an unwanted pregnancy: condoms or the pill? I'm not sexually active now, but I don't think I'll be a virgin forever. — *Nameless, Charleston, S.C.*

Nameless: Improvements in condoms and birth control pills are making both more effective in preventing unwanted pregnancies. The latest figures I have show condoms to be 98 percent effective, while the pill is effective 97 percent of the time. But the pill offers no protection against sexually transmitted diseases. Condoms are 98 percent effective in preventing these diseases.

If you're only going to use one of these methods of birth control, go with condoms.

However, I would be remiss if I didn't remind you that abstinence is 100 percent effective in all areas. — *Dr. Robert Wallace welcomes questions from readers.
